## Additional Stakeholder and Customer Feedback

This document provides a summary of additional feedback from stakeholders provided after the draft documents had been submitted to directors for certification. Some of this feedback is included in section 5 of the Main Proposal, but the letters have since been provided. In addition to the letters, we have included a draft of the flyer that will be made available to the public through council owned community hubs, such as libraries.

Stakeholder	Formal Feedback Received (to date)	Letter
<b>Genesis Energy</b>	Raised concerns with the precedent of allowing streamlined CPPs. Indicated broad support for the community welfare aspects of the proposed expenditure as well. They also supported the risk reduction afforded to other EDBs by making the spares available for use in the event of natural disasters elsewhere in the country	Attached
<b>Business New Zealand</b>	Expressed concern for the welfare of Wellington and NZ wide business communities in the event of a major earthquake under the current state. Supportive of the business case as it aligns with their recognition of the importance of improving the economy's resiliency to natural disaster events.	Attached
<b>Nova Energy</b>	Nova indicated that it recognises the value of being ready to respond quickly and effectively to restore power supplies in the event of a major earthquake; thereby ensuring communities can start the recovery process without undue delay.	Attached
<b>Lower Hutt City Council</b>	Mayor Wallace found it hard to disagree with the pragmatic and sensible initiatives proposed in the business case.	Attached
<b>New Zealand Lifelines Council</b>	Noted that the proposal is consistent with New Zealand Lifeline Council's mission and purpose.	Attached
<b>Built Environment Leaders Steering Committee</b>	Supportive of the proposal as it aligns with the forum's priority of identifying and improving the resilience of NZ's most critical infrastructure components and systems.	Attached
<b>CentrePort Wellington</b>	Support the proposal and associated price increase. Recognise that there is much more work to be done to improve electricity resilience and urge the Commission to approve this interim step.	Attached
<b>Massey University</b>	Generally very supportive of initiatives that will reduce earthquake risk. Expressed concern at price increase coming at a time when they are looking to reduce energy costs	Attached
<b>Capital Coast District Healthboard</b>	Supportive of initiatives that will reduce the risk of extended outages. Expressed concern at price increase.	Attached
